#### Back to the Future

Happy New Year! We are excited to welcome you back to our Cathedral after the Summer break, and hope you have had the opportunity for life-giving rest and re-creation. On this final Sunday before the start of a new academic year, there will be a special blessing for all those returning to teaching and learning. Please bring your backpacks, briefcases, equipment or other symbols of learning so that we can pray God's blessing upon them and yourselves.

We also reach the end of the Church's Season of Epiphany, and consider the ways in which God reveals himself and calls us to be attentive to his voice.

Our Gospel reading details the presentation of the baby Jesus in the Temple, and highlights the role of the Holy Spirit in giving wisdom and direction to our lives. Simeon's final words draw our attention away from the celebration of the birth of Christ towards the suffering and sacrificial redemption of the cross.

This year more than ever, God invites us to listen more attentively with open ears, eyes and hearts, so that we might grow in our faithfulness as disciples of Christ. We are called to bring all of who we are to God, and to follow Jesus wholeheartedly. As we journey together through Lent, we will explore the spiritual practice of developing a Rule of Life, in order to Live, Love and Serve faithfully together. 
