Abide in me as I abide in you



Today we consider what it is to live fruitful lives. On ANZAC Sunday we remember the sacrifices of others in securing freedom, following the pattern of Jesus Christ who gave himself that we might have fullness of life for eternity.

Lives of meaning and purpose require us to make wise decisions, but in God's economy, we are most shaped by our identity and relationship in Christ. Saint John uses a beautiful metaphor of a vine to help clarify the intimate nature of our life in Christ, reminding us of who we are in light of Jesus' command of self-giving love.

God has a plan and purpose for us, therefore we are tended to, cleansed and shaped (pruned) in order to bear fruit. As such, we must be proactive in our lifestyle to abide in Christ, who envelopes us in his grace and peace. Counter to our society which champions the sovereignty of the individual, we are to be a living community of disciples who commit to abide - addressing our posture and place to live present to and with Jesus - so that we can grow and reproduce spiritually. Whilst there are no solitary Christians, we are also to take responsibility for our own personal walk with God, loving, living and serving him, and loving others as ourselves.

Today we also welcome with great joy the arrival of The Reverend Sue Paton, as she is Collated and Installed as our new Canon Precentor. May Sue and her husband Josh find among us Christ's welcome as we grow in lives of love and worship.
